 - o Your email address, one that we can contact you later
 - Project Title
 - o Team Name, if applicable

GOALS AND CONTENT: PROJECT MUST INCLUDE ALL OF THE FOLLOWING

- The main goal of this project is to identify a community's strengths and concerns, which allows critical dialogue about important issues, such as substance use and mental health.
- **Projects should** explore the best way to prevent and reduce substance use in our community. This should include highlighting the significance of this problem, facts, and a persuasive CALL TO ACTION. A Call to Action will tell your audience what they should do to help prevent or reduce this problem in their community.
- Concise explanation of your topic and point.
- Must properly cite ALL sources that you include. APA, MLA, Chicago, etc., whichever you choose, cite your sources.

CHOOSE ONE PROJECT TYPE TO SUBMIT:

OPTION 1: PSA or Video

- 3-minute maximum
- All sources MUST be cited, and attached as a document along with your Project. They must be submitted together.
- Acceptable formats: MP4. *If the file is too large to send, please contact us. You may upload to a cloud platform for us to download your project.

OPTION 2: Persuasive Presentation

- 10-slide maximum
- Slides should be content-driven, with appropriate visuals to explain your point.
- All sources MUST be cited, and included on your last slide. Citations will not be counted toward your slide limit.
- Avoid putting content in the Notes section, as they will not be included for review.
- Acceptable formats: Microsoft Powerpoint, PDF, or Prezi link.
 - o *if you have another platform you are using, please ask if it is acceptable.
- Not Accepted/Compatible formats: Presenter (Mac); Google Presentation.
 - o *If you are using these platforms, please convert to PDF to submit your project.

OPTION 3: Persuasive Essay

- 2-page maximum
- Times New Roman, size 12 Font, 1" margins; double-spaced.
- Sources cited will not be counted toward 2-page maximum. Citation page may be single-spaced.
- Acceptable formats: PDF document ONLY
